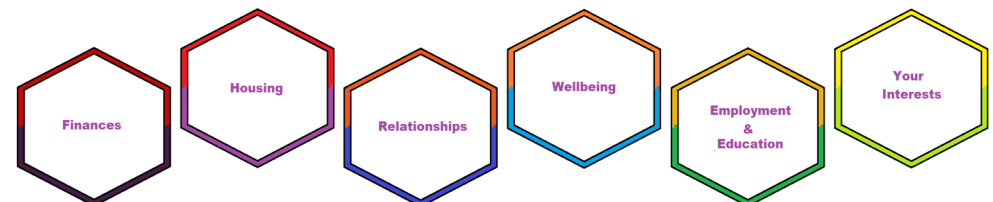

What is P.A.S.S.?

Plymouth Autism Spectrum Service (P.A.S.S.) provides a dedicated and specialist service for autistic adults, their families, and Health and Social Care Services. P.A.S.S. collaborates with community organisations within Plymouth.

P.A.S.S. offers three services:

1. Autism assessment
2. Advice and signposting for autistic adults
3. Specialist training and consultation to Livewell and Plymouth City Council practitioners Email: live-well.pass@nhs.net

How do I access P.A.S.S.?

If you would like an autism assessment you should ask your GP or health/social care worker to refer you. You cannot self refer for an autism assessment.

If you have had an autism assessment and described as autistic you can complete a self-referral form and send it to us via post or email. You can find the form on our website: <https://www.livewellsouthwest.co.uk>.

Adults who already have diagnosis of autism will be asked to share written evidence of their diagnosis with P.A.S.S.

What happens when we receive your referral?

If you have asked for an autism assessment your information will be reviewed to see if we think an assessment is required, if yes, then you will be offered a place on the waiting list.

If you have asked for advice or signposting, you or the referrer will be asked to send in confirmation of your diagnosis of autism. Once we have seen this, you will be offered an introductory appointment.

If you do not have sufficient evidence of a diagnosis of autism, we will offer you a place on the waiting list for an assessment.

What happens once my referral is accepted?

If you have asked for an autism assessment, we will invite you to an appointment once your referral reaches the top of the waiting list. You will be sent information about the assessment. You can also look at our website for more information.

If you have asked for advice or signposting, you will be given the opportunity to talk about your current experiences and we will develop an action plan to help meet your needs. We will support you to carry out the action plan.
